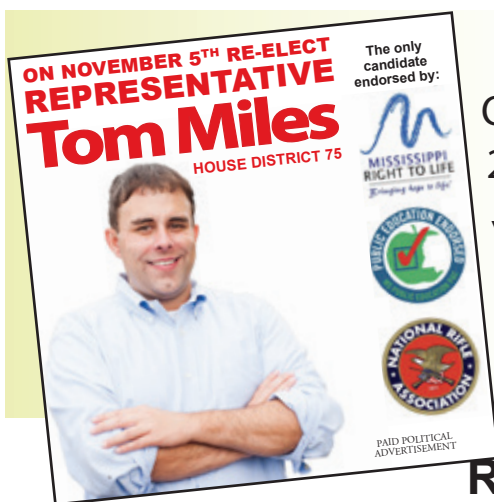

"Congratulations to all of our students, parents, educators, school board, and each community for our schools' test scores. The Rankin County School District (RCSD) is an "A" rated school district again and we are one of the TOP TEN districts in the state of Mississippi! Our students are continuing our 'tradition of excellence!' said Dr. Sue Townsend, Superintendent of Education.

- The district grew 17 points from a 690/A to a 707/A (TOP TEN IN MS).
- Graduation rate grew from 88.9 percent to 90.3 percent.
- Reading proficiency grew from

53.1 to 55.4.

- Math proficiency grew from 58.2 to 62.7.
- Acceleration grew from 69.9 to 71.4. These are the students who are getting college credit with dual credit or Advanced Placement courses.
- History proficiency grew from 70.8 to 72.3
- Math growth of lowest performing students grew from 59.7 to 61.8.

"We are very proud of all our accomplishments, but the test scores also showed a decrease of 6.2 points in English Language Arts Low Performing Growth. We will increase our intentional focus even more on this group to help them move to the next level," shared

"While we all know the RCSD has a multitude of "non-tested" accomplish-

ments to celebrate daily, we also know that academic achievement and accountability are important and are used as a measuring stick for our schools," elaborated Dr. Townsend, "Our mission each day is to intentionally focus on empowering our students to reach their maximum potential in all areas. Our students continue to set high goals, and they strive to reach those goals."

As the third largest school district in Mississippi, seven out of eight zones are A and B zones. One zone (Richland) is a B and C zone. The high school is a B and the two elementary schools received a C rating.

All 11 of the RCSD high schools and middle schools are A's and B's while 11 elementary schools are A's, 3 B's, and 2 C's.

Update on acorn production

Thirty-four different native oak species (and numerous hybrids) are found in Mississippi. Oaks are divided into two groups, red oak species and white oak species. There are several physiological differences regarding acorn production. One of the most distinctive difference between red and white oaks is the length of time required to produce acorns. Red oak acorns take 15 months (two growing seasons), and white oak acorns take three months (one growing season) to mature. If you look closely at the twigs of red oak species, you will notice small, immature acorns on the current year's growth and mature acorns on last year's growth. The mature acorns were formed last year, and the smaller, immature acorns will be next year's crop. For this reason, sometimes red oak species have a good acorn crop, when white oak acorns are nearly nonexistent due to a late freeze earlier in the year.

In natural settings, oaks usually take somewhere in the neighborhood of 25-35 years to produce acorns consistently. However, acorn crops are highly inconsistent. This is from a variety of factors, including poor pollination, late spring freezes/frosts, drought, acorn weevil population levels, soil productivity, and genetic makeup of individual trees. While annual acorn production is difficult to predict, larger diameter trees with large crowns typically produce greater amounts of acorns than smaller diameter trees with smaller crowns.

Members of the oak genus are monoecious, meaning both male and female flowers are on the same tree. However, wind pollination and some variation in timing of male and female flowers on an individual tree ensures cross-pollination among nearby trees. Male flowers are pollen-producing stamens on catkins, and female flowers are the short spikes on lead axils. For this reason, acorns are produced on the ends of twigs. Consequently, trees with large, well developed, exposed dominant or codominant

crowns have a greater likelihood of being good acorn producers compared to small-crowned, shaded trees.

Hard mast is a term that applies to the fruit (nuts) of oak (acorns), hickory, pecan, walnut, and beech trees. Hard mast is an important food source used by a variety of wildlife species, including white-tailed deer, wild turkeys, squirrels, ducks, and many nongame birds and mammals. While available primarily during fall and winter months, acorns and nuts are an important source of food for wildlife due to their widespread occurrence, palatability, nutritive quality, and availability during a time when other food sources are not available.

Most folks concerned with increasing mast production for wildlife food are only concerned with increasing acorn production (oak species) and pay relatively little attention to other hard mast species (hickory, walnuts, beeches, etc.). Many of these landowners attempt to supplement their properties with non-native oak species such as sawtooth oak (native to eastern Asia) in an effort to produce greater quantities of acorns during hunting seasons. While sawtooth oak has these attributes, the tree may not serve this role as well as some believe. Mississippi hunting seasons usually start in early October, and, by then, the typical sawtooth acorn crop will either be gone or in the last stages of acorn drop. Most sawtooth trees start acorn drop in mid-August to early September and are finished by the time hunters enter the woods to hunt over the year's crop.

Several native species can provide desired wildlife food sources while providing acorns during later periods of the year, which will be more beneficial to hunters and wildlife. An example is Nuttall oak. It is one of the fastest growing-oak species in Mississippi, drops acorns late in the fall and winter (October and December), and has relatively heavy mast crops. With fertilization and irrigation, acorns can be produced in as little as 5-10 years (more typically 25-30 years). Other oak species that should be considered as alternatives to sawtooth include, swamp chestnut oak, Shumard oak, and others.

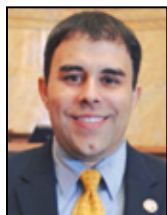

I humbly ask for your support, vote, and prayers on November 5. My door is open, and my telephone is always on. I'll welcome your call.

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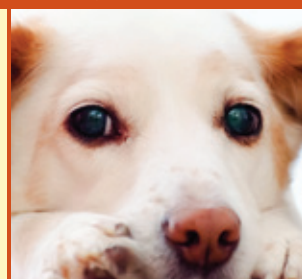
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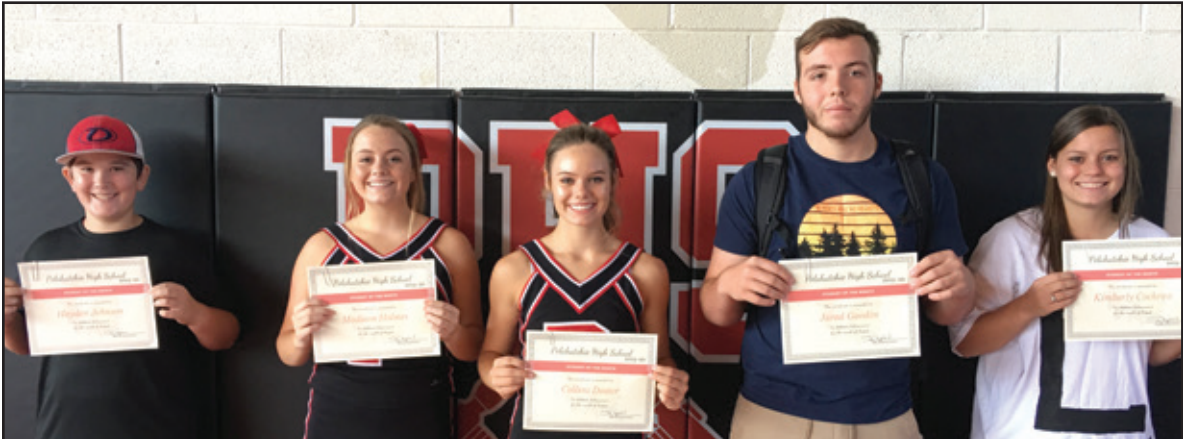

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Emergency funds protect against disasters

One of the most effective tools for preventing a large-scale financial disaster is an emergency fund, an amount of money that is set aside to cover unexpected expenses, or to keep you afloat if no regular income is coming in.

Even if you have a great handle on your finances, unexpected challenges can come along that threaten your financial stability – losing a job, dealing with an injury or illness, or having to help a family member who is in need. If you're not collecting a paycheck, or if you have large, out-of-the-ordinary costs to cover, that can throw your monthly budget completely off track.

The goal is not to touch the money except in a real emergency. If you have it at the ready when you really need it, ideally it will last long enough to get you back on your financial feet.

Putting It Together:

To create your emergency fund, multiply your monthly take-home pay times six to find the amount you should ideally save.

It's usually not practical or possible to create a fully funded emergency fund in one shot. Instead, plan to add to it on a regular basis, in an amount you can reasonably afford, until it reaches your goal value. If you do have to dip into the fund, it's important to start building it back up as soon as you have the resources to do so.

Where the Money Should Be:

The whole point of an emergency fund is that you should be able to get your hands on the money quickly, and

without risking losing money by using those funds—which might be the case if you had to sell off stocks or other investment holdings.

A standard savings account makes good sense as a place for your emergency funds. It is a straightforward way to put away money that you can access easily. An added bonus is that a balance in a savings account can reduce or even eliminate charges on your checking account.

Instead, liquid investments, or those that you can turn quickly and easily into cash, can be a good place to park the money that's in your emergency fund. A combination of relatively short-term certificates of deposit (CDs) and US treasury bills will generally work well.

Ladder to Safety:

If you are using CDs as the holding place for your emergency fund, one smart approach is to use a technique known as laddering. Instead of putting a large sum into a single CD with a specific term, you split your principal into three or more CDs that mature in a stepped pattern—perhaps every six months over an 18-month period. Each time a CD matures, you roll it over for another year so the ladder continues. That means that you have a lump sum available every six months if you need the cash, without having to pay any penalties.

Pastor's perspective: I am the vine, and you are the branches

During most of the sixteen years that we served as missionaries to Brazil, we lived in the city of Caxias do Sul in

the southernmost state of Rio Grande do Sul. The area was settled by Italian immigrants in the 1800s. Even today, there are pockets of people out in the country who still speak Italian in their family conversations. Many customs and traditions that were brought from the "Old Country" are still being followed with conviction and almost a sense of reverence.

When the settlers came from Italy, not only did they bring their language and cultural customs with them, they also brought grape vines, because the area of Italy where they came from was prominently known for producing grapes and wine. The countryside in the Northeastern section of Rio Grande do Sul was also similar to their native land, with high rolling hills and rushing rivers in the valleys.

So, the settlers soon had large vineyards producing abundant grapes. Even today, a drive through the grape producing hills is very picturesque, with grape trellises stretching as far as you can see. And there are family vineyards that are proud of the fact that they still have some of vines that were brought to Brazil by their forefathers.

When we built our home in the Crossroads Community, I planted some muscadine vines in our back yard. They produce great tasting fruit which we enjoy eating. Sometimes I will just stand under the trellis and eat muscadines till I get my fill. And some years Kathy will make jelly from our own little vineyard. Of course, by the time you read this, muscadine season will be over. In fact, even as I write this, the last fruit is drying up on the vines.

Apparently, we are not alone in enjoying the muscadines straight from the vines. Almost every night, I can hear my little pack of Teddy Roosevelt Terriers barking like crazy in the back yard. This summer they have treed both a raccoon and a 'possum in one of my pear trees. But most nights, they are under the muscadine vines. And it's because there is

a rat hiding among the vines! I'm not sure if the rats actually like to eat muscadines, or the vines just serve as a hiding place for them!

I go out to the muscadine vines with my flashlight and pellet pistol. My arriv-

al makes the dogs get even more excited. They will all be barking and jumping as high as they can toward the vines. A few times, I have spotted the varmint, and my pellet pistol never misses! The dogs go into a frenzy when the rat hits the ground! A few times, the rat has taken the leap of faith, and jumps to ground. If the dogs see him do that, there follows a mad dash toward the pile of pallets that are stacked nearby as the rat seeks refuge underneath them. But most nights, I can never find the rat. Those nights, I usually end up carrying one or more of

the dogs to their overnight kennels, because they won't leave their prey.

Several times during his ministry, Jesus spoke about the vineyard and the grapes that are produced there. In chapter 15 of John's Gospel, Jesus talks at length about the vine and the branches on the vine. He talks about the importance of the branches producing fruit. He also explains what should be done with branches that do not bear fruit.

Jesus said in John 15:5-6, "I am the vine, and you are the branches. Those who remain in me, and I in them, will bear much fruit; for you can do nothing without me. Those who do not remain in me are thrown out like a branch and dry up; such branches are gathered up and thrown into the fire, where they are burned."

If you are a follower of Jesus, you must be careful to remain connected to Him! And you must also do what he expects you to do, and that is to "bear much fruit." If you are not doing those things, maybe it's time for you get started! And if you are not a follower of Jesus, there would be no better time than today to get connected to Him! Be sure to take your family to church on Sunday!

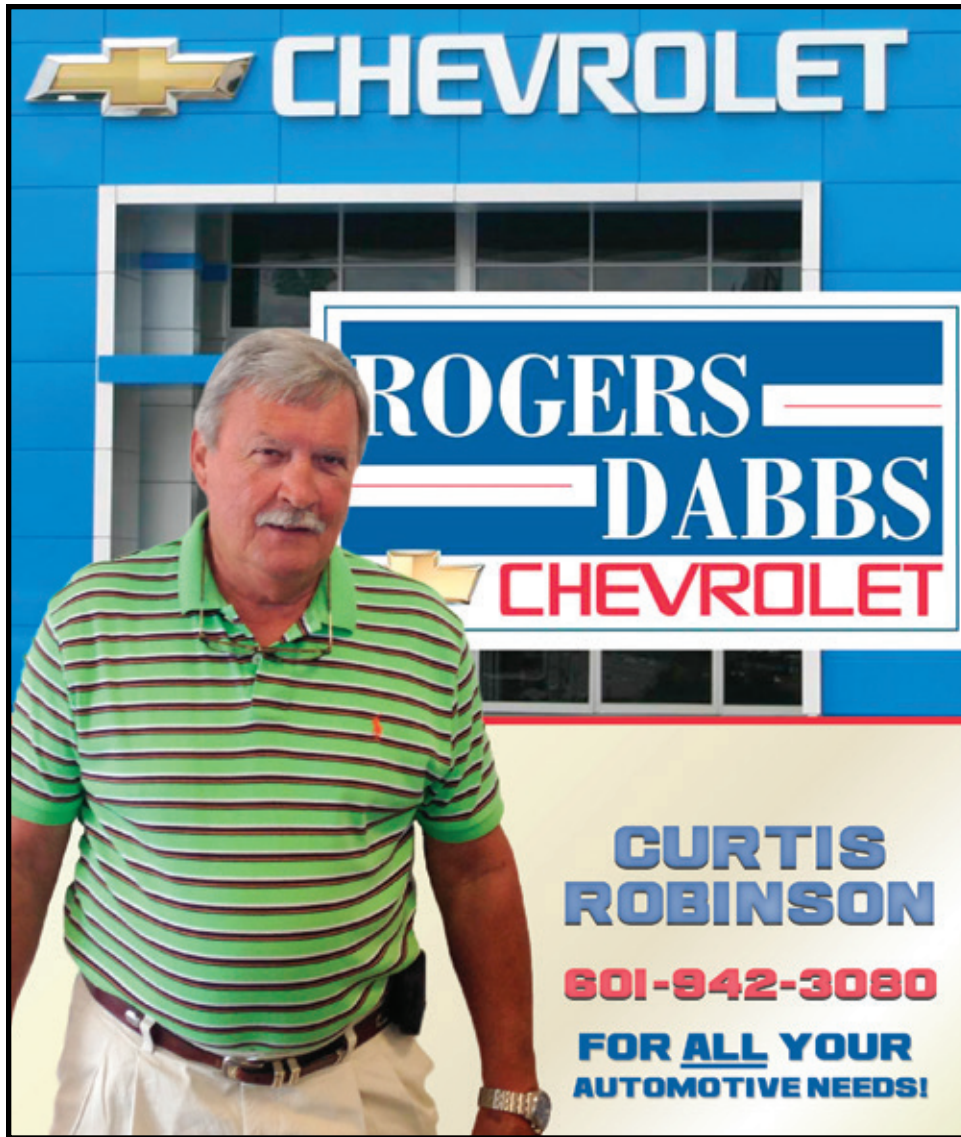
